Hello, Neighbour! DABRO FARM MARKET

This month we are going to visit our neighbour in the western end of the Gaspereau Valley.

I had the pleasure of speaking with Shawn and Laura Davidson

about Dabro Farm Market early in September. I interviewed Shawn at the roadside market amid the steady stream of c u s t o m e r s . Wonderful!



Dabro Farm Market started around 2008 when Laura Davidson started raising hens for fresh eggs. The surplus was sold at a small stand across from their home. During the beginning of the Mad Cow period, Shawn wound up with some excess beef on his hands and added ground beef to the offerings. They soon realized that more room was needed so the old shed was renovated and this provided more space, which in turn resulted in a true farm market feel.

Besides the large number of local customers, they currently have regular customers from as far away as Halifax.

When I asked Shawn how the pandemic has affected business, he said that there was an increase almost from the first day of the shutdown. We agreed that perhaps it could have been better for the government to support the local markets during this time.

From inside the market you may get to see some of the animals and birds that call this place home. It may be sheep, a donkey, a

horse and of course, chickens.

Meat offerings at the market include beef, lamb, chickens and turkeys and geese in season. These are all raised



on the farm and are government inspected. A short list of products include: ground beef, beef sausages of different flavours, lamb, chicken, meatballs, stew meat, chicken and eggs. Do you have a special meat request? Check with Shawn.

When looking for products to help fill the shelves, Shawn's focus is on local suppliers. Most are suppliers from the areas of White Rock, Greenwich, Black River and surrounding areas. These products include vegetables, honey, preserves, baked goods and kindling. The market is now carrying a Dirkhauser frozen yogurt that must be tried!

So now that the fall season is near, perhaps you have the hankering for a good stew. Stop by the market and pick up everything that you need. (And watch out for the chickens!)
