# Black River Community Hall 2006 - 2007

It has now been 16 years since Community members banded together to revive the old schoolhouse as a community hall. Several members met with Mr. Paul Collins, Manager, Strategic Development Initiative, Nova Scotia Department of Tourism, Culture and Heritage regarding the preservation of the Black River School House. The building was deemed worth preserving and was in remarkable shape due to the good efforts of the ladies of The Black River Community Club taking care of it.

Two letters went out the community to attend an open meeting of all those interested in restoring the building and to find out what support would be available. The 1st meeting was Oct. 22, 2006 at the old Schoolhouse. The 2nd meeting took place November 5, 2006 at Trina Long's. With new officers elected and registered with Registry of Joint Stocks for the province of Nova Scotia plans could be developed for the school house and community activities.

I thought I would share some minutes taken unofficially by Mary Ann Long during those early days, to refresh our memories.

There have been two meetings and another one today Dec. 3, 2006 so I decided to follow up a little with this information.

There has been a great support of people in the community to put the Black River Community Hall back into existence.

**Dec. 1, 2006** the stove was in, and the fire was started Friday evening. Zane (Long), Lian (Hettema), Perry (Munro) and myself were there - it was great. Larry (Long) donated 1/2 cord of wood, also Blake Spinney. Larry took car to vineyard, Trina Long, Bruce Long and I hauled the wood, then Zane, Bruce, Trina and I tore the floor covering up and Bruce and I hauled it to the dump. Bruce and I split kindling and took it down, supplied by Bruce. Helen Long, Shirley Carter and I sold ticket's on wreath donated by Laurie Levy. Total amount \$101.00. More to be sold.

**Dec. 2/06** - was cleaning day at the hall several people showed up to make the job easier. It was fun. Blake and Perry hauled wood (Blake's), several helped put that in. Lian worked on the roof (patched for now), Zane put up light fixtures, fixed lock on door. So was a busy day by all but fun. Tonight Larry and I went to New Minas and got a few things for Hall.

**Dec. 3/06**-Meeting at Hall approx. 42 present. As of today 51 signed up for membership. Money clear \$1645 calendars made by Sharon Lake, more to be sold also tickets on wreath, lunch served, also birthday cake for Lian as his birthday is Dec. 4. -Wishes sang by all to Bruce Long and Lian. Great time had by all. Helen Long volunteered to do cards for sick, newcomers, etc. Lunch prepared by many hands. Tickets, memberships sold by Clara Spinney, Mary Ann, Tammy Schofield, Tracey Pick.



## NATURE'S PANTRY AND PHARMACY Start Your Seeds Now...

Well here we are once again in the spring of a new year. This last year has been an interesting one for all. One of the notable things that has occurred in the last year, has been the renewed interest in home gardening. With people having to spend more time at home last spring and summer, it was a natural thing to try their hand at gardening of some kind. Planters, raised beds, small plot gardens; we saw it all. One of the things that I have heard comments about was the success or failure at starting plants indoors for transplanting later on. Raising transplants can be challenging. What can I start from seed? Can everything be transplanted or must some things be

planted right in the garden? From long time gardeners and my own experiences, there is one basic guide to follow-you will find it very difficult to transplant root vegetables. In other words, plants like carrots, turnips, potatoes, parsnips, etc. should only be transplanted when very young and small. They do not like



their roots disturbed when the plants are older. In most cases these are plants that do fine in the garden anyway so don't bother. Some of the most successful plants to start indoors are: tomatoes, peppers and herbs. Here is a list of vegetables you might want to try this year. Remember to use good quality soil and follow instructions on the seed package.
