The White Rock Bridge was closed in May 2003 due to partial collapse. This was the main route to "get up the mountain". People had to detour east down the White Rock Road to Benjamin Bridge, turning right on the Black River Road and then right onto Corkum Burns Road (locally known as the Aggie Weir Road), past the public beach at Lumsden. During this period and due to the increased traffic, the Corkum Burns Road was well maintained by the Department of Transportation. The detour was in effect until a one lane Bailey bridge and lights were installed to allow traffic to use the mountain route, once again, while a new bridge was being built in the Spring of 2004.

While at work on one particular day it began to snow. I realized, once I was on my way home, that I should have left work earlier. At the White Rock corner I met up with Andrew Livingstone (Taryn Long's partner) and my brother Grayden. We had stopped there because we were undecided as to whether we should go up the mountain over the bailey bridge or take the detour. We did not feel comfortable travelling across the makeshift bridge and even less comfortable should we not be able to make it up the mountain. My memory is a bit fuzzy but there may have been others that had tried to get up the mountain by way of the bridge and had difficulty making it that way.

We decided on the detour with Andrew in the lead, then me

and then my brother. We made it across Lumsden Dam, down the dip and around the bend and back up the hill, with some difficulty. We all stopped at the base of hill on the Corkum Burns Road just past the last cottage to discuss what to do. Andrew decided to try the hill, I followed a distance behind him and then my brother. I will note that none of us had 4wheel drive!

As we were struggling to make our way, we could see headlights coming toward us! I thought to myself "don't make us stop as we will never get going again!"

The truck coming toward us was driven by

Larry Long. He saw us coming up the hill and he put his 4-wheel drive truck in reverse and backed up the hill the rest of the way along Corkum Burns! His tracks made it easier for us to drive on that deep snow covered road and make our way home.

For my family and I, Larry was a much liked, respected and appreciated neighbour! Everyone should have "a Larry" in their lives.



Words Uncovered

The Dead Die Twice Abandoned Cemeteries of Nova Scotia by Steve Skafte was a book brought to our Book Club last month. It reminded me of an article written by Judi Atwell Munro, a few years ago, on cleaning the headstones in our Black River Cemetery which was established in 1861.

"One of the projects discussed by members of the Heritage Committee was the cleaning of some of the oldest headstones in the cemetery. For years these old headstones have been unreadable due to the formation of mosses and lichens on their surfaces. Before we began I really did not have a lot of optimism that cleaning them would produce results. I am happy to say I was so wrong. Clara (Long) Spinney and I began with the idea that we would just try cleaning a couple of stones, and voila, the inscriptions came out so clearly it was unbelievable. It was like eating peanuts - we could barely stop the cleaning process, and we went from headstone to headstone, exclaiming the clarity of each one. Names that had been familiar to us only because they appeared in the old census records or family genealogies leapt from the stones. We have not completed the project but plan to continue in September.

Cemetery land is believed donated by John Reid, who along

with his son Andrew, was buried there in 1864. Some of the stones were inscripted with verses from the Bible, or a simple poetic phrase. We began to notice the emblems carved on the stones - many



were in the form of a tree, some an open Bible, some a hand pointing towards heaven. From the information on the stones you could determine that a family had lost of number of members in a short period of time; some of them were young children, probably from an epidemic of diphtheria, scarlet fever, or influenza. In one case a husband and wife died within days of each other. It brings home the harshness of life during those years, and the courage it took to survive.

Certainly there is a spiritual quality to the experience of sitting on one of the newly installed benches, beneath the cedars, and surrounded by the old headstones. It is the history of generations clustered in the quiet of a summer afternoon."

The photo below was taken in White Rock in 1902. We are looking for some help in identifying the people. Black River and White Rock share many family members and we are hoping you will recognize someone and pass it along to us. Also we are curious as to what is the occasion? On the back of the photo is the following text ... "to Joe Smith with best wishes from his friend and teacher Retta Vaughan in memory of July 4, 1902. (Retta is on the far right, 2nd row from back). Joe Smith - 2nd row, white shirt frills & long tie; Howard Smith - back row, 2nd from Retta (tall); Milford Schofield (?) -3rd row 1st on left - tie askew."



The photo below is of a cedar slab sawn from one of the cedar trees in the Black

River Cemetery. In November of 2022 a strong wind took it down and at the same time three other trees had to be removed because they were dying.

In order to keep it from checking too much Jeff Long soaked it in antifreeze over the winter, then used a gunstock stain. He also constructed a stand for better viewing.

The slab is very heavy and measures approx. 22"x 20". Jeff counted 95 rings which would make it planted around 1928.

It is unknown who planted the cedar trees in the cemetery but Jeff suggests it seems reasonable to assume that they



were planted by the family whose headstones they were near. This tree was near headstones of the Picks, Payzants and Schofields.

"Cedar is sometimes called the "Graveyard Tree" as it was so often planted in burial grounds. A reason perhaps is because they were so long lived and needled evergreen foliage symbolized eternal life. Another idea is if you plant a cedar, when it gets tall enough to shade a grave, it's time for you to die. Or Cedars are often used to drive out negative energy and purify homes." I like that idea best.

• This past month has gone so quickly, and the summer is going so fast.


• The hummingbirds are in full swing. There for a while I was worrying about not having many but things have picked up; although the count is down from other summers. The young must be what is making up the count.
