School Days & The Christmas Concert

When I started school back in the 1930's, Edna, Don, Mark and Keith

I loved history and geography. My imagination would just run away with me. Sometimes the teacher would have to awaken me because I would be daydreaming about how exciting it would have been to have lived then, or what kind of houses they lived in, or what kind of clothing they wore. I loved it all.

When I think of the Christmas Concerts - oh my! They were such a BIG DEAL and not just for us kids at school. The whole community looked forward to them. Every child was involved in something. I remember having a recitation - 4 lines. I had to stand on a big wooden box so that everyone could see me.

In one skit I was the baker. The teacher made me a costume with stars all over it. I held up my letter and told my story, then the next child would hold up their letter and tell their story. I remember one of the kids acted the part of the doctor. We would spend days decorating the school and boy, didn't that school smell good. We had it decorated with boughs and big crepe paper bows. Beautiful!

A Long Time Ago

I grew up with my brothers and sister on Schofield Road in the 1920's. When Christmas time came around we were excited to receive a package of clothing and presents from my mother's sister in the States. My father would cut us a Christmas tree and we made paper chains and other homemade ornaments to decorate it. I remember one Christmas when all of us kids were sick with Scarlet Fever and the doctor came from Wolfville by horse to tend us. I remember that my brother Keith was just a baby and was very ill but we all recovered and lived healthy lives. Christmas dinner was a special occasion for us and we would have roast chicken or pork as my father always raised some pigs and of course we had chickens for eggs and meat. In the Fall my mother would make mincemeat from either

venison or rabbits and we also had plenty of apples from the orchard. Sometimes she made caraway cookies using seeds she had gathered. Life was simple but we had lots of food and fun.

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Sunken Lake and Area Journal of Wildlife Observations recorded by Clara Spinney

Oct 27 - Saw a beautiful doe deer today. It was so grey in colour it resembled a mule deer in many ways. I had a really good look at her as she was as interested in me as I was in her.

Oct 29 - Have noticed a few hooded mergansers in the lake; not near what there used to be. Also a few black ducks and mallards still around enjoying the lake.

Nov 3- To my surprise I came upon a porcupine. I believe it was one of this year's. I was convinced they were extinct as it has been so long since I have seen one and no one mentions seeing them. Lots of people seeing fishers which are enemies of the porcupine.

Nov 6 - My first nuthatch was here today looking for my bird feeders; sorry not out yet. I have wanted to see a bear all summer long. Thought it was not going to happen but finally I saw two small ones - probably year olds. That sighting just made things worse, I want to see them all the time. So beautiful!

Many people are sighting flocks of geese in the harvested fields around. A few flocks have flown over the lake, honking. One of the great sounds from nature. Although their honking seems sad in the Fall.

Nov 12 - Some people noted the large flock of crows gathering in the fields down and around Spinney Hill before you get to the Hall.

I have had a couple of opportunities to see the hundreds of geese that gather on Lumsden Pond mid-mornings. It's a beautiful sight!
