## Christmas Moments from an Old Diary

Christmas memories are so often messy. Sometimes sadness and regret are stickier than joy, so I dug into my childhood journals (mostly misspelled) to look for "the better". Hope you will find a point of recognition.

**1953** - Just born and noisy. My Aunt Merle said she stood at the end of her driveway "waving (her) arm off to say hello, but Lloyd and Ruby didn't even notice because they only had eyes for that baby girl."

1955 - One or all of my brothers got a cap gun and cowboy hat.

Always, for Christmas dinner came grandparents and for the repeat feast three hours later!! maybe cousins and other grandparents. China cups polished and gravy!!dressing!!!pies!! Next to our new puppy collie, a rubber stuffed doll I called Cappy (couldn't say Cathy) was my best friend for years.

**1957** - I started to read this year ... from hymn books! There was nothing I liked better than to be snuggled between Mum and Dad at the Baptist Church and hear the familiar carols.



We always went, three little boys in "suits", me in a felt hat, playing thumb games with Dad. The church was full and Mrs. (Mildred) Atwell made the old pump organ wheez out the harmonies. Innocent times when the baby Jesus was more real to me than the possibility of growing up.

**1958** - The last Concert in Black River School before consolidation for the older students.

**1960** - I loved being in the barn with steaming cows who definitely knew me, Dad belting out hymns and war songs over the milkers' putt-putt. Umm, the smell of corn silage (and I don't mind cow poop, either.) Loose hay in the mows and cats for conversation. Remember the smell of Steadman's, the lit windows of Wolfville, Robertson's animal candy on shelves?

**1961** - Mum and Dad had a square dance between Christmas and New Year. This is the one where Bing, our cat climbed the Xmas tree, spilled mud all over the floor ... and lived.

**1962** - I think Richard had a girrrrrlfriend and he was allowed to have a sock hop dance in our living room with the regulars just before Christmas, Hank and Donna, Gladys and Johnny Saltzman, and more. My eyes were pretty big.

**1963** - A train wreck of a year. Brian was deathly ill and in Boston for a dangerous surgery. Mum cooked a 40?50? pound turkey,

(NOT an exaggeration) and flew to Boston Christmas Day. We ate that damn turkey every day till after it became toxic. It didn't feel like real Christmas till when skinny, pale Brian shuffled in the door at home. Great scar though. Laurie would distract me with Monoply and THEN, insist on winning! Imagine.

**1965** - "Mum and I went skiing. She is really good and can go fast. I kept falling." Dad sometimes played games in the house, mostly physical challenges. We were all glad of his story telling. The boys endured high expectations. Do NOT tell my brothers I admit being lazy.

**1966** - "Laurie and I went skating on the pond." I had an early present of a shiny dress from Franks' in Wolfville. Against all good reason, I was allowed to go to the Christmas dance at Horton (Grade 7!) where I glued myself to the wall in terror and shyly admired all the brush cuts and upturned white collars of

those mysterious boys on the opposite wall.

"Dad is not feeling well." (He had had a major heart attack in the spring, but it took a second one to make him quit smoking Export A's.) "Dad is teaching me to play crib when he can sit up for a while. (And then he lived till his late eighties!). I got a slip, a diary, some gogo socks, I LOVE them!, a little silver jewelry case, a necklace and a boughten sweater (which I loathed! An itchier piece of clothing was never created nor lasted longer.)



**1969** - Remember walking the dark halls of Horton with the choir holding REAL candles singing "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel". Recall the potato scallop, baked beans fundraisers in the gym (still smelling like sweaty boys .. not all bad) while the band played carols.

**1970** - On Christmas Day, we were stuck under four feet of snow. (The WORST - no company, no shared dinners, no grandparents or cousins. Booo!) Thank goodness we had the old dial up black phones to connect with the outside world ... and entertain the neighbours on the party line.



• It's been a slow go for Nature News this month. The main topic of conversation every day is the amount of geese. We've never had geese like this before. There have been lots stop over here at Sunken Lake, which a few short years ago was

unheard of. Although I enjoy seeing and hearing them I understand not wanting them as residents.



- •. We still have three black ducks giving short visits. This is late in the season for them to be still here but the warm fall is probably to blame for that.
- The small flock of mergansers are still here but that is the usual for them. They are not people friendly birds.
- There have not been many small birds around, usually they are here looking for the feeders to be up. My



feeders are not up yet. I wait for the first good snow fall. Even people I have talked with that have their feeders up tell me the bird count is way down compared to other years.

• I'm still on friendly terms with the beaver although I don't understand them. Every night, overnight sometimes, they bring branches to my shoreline and peel them, snack on the bark and leave the naked branches behind. This is something new they are doing. I don't know where they are getting the branches, I've checked my bushes and shrubs. The mystery continues.
