Carrie Grover Project

Julie Mainstone Savas has given us a wonderful look at Carrie Grover, who we call Carrie Spinney Grover in Black River. Many of us know of her from earlier columns in this newsletter and because she is related to people in Black River. Carrie well deserves the recognition for her "Heritage of Songs" collection and for shining a light on life in Black River in the 1800's in her manuscript, which was brought to Black River by her daughters in the 1950's. She grew up in a time when singing was part of daily life and families made their own entertainment. Her family, especially her mother, Eliza (Long) Spinney valued the songs of her parents and those of her husband George Spinney. She realized that their music was rapidly fading in everyone's memory and was afraid that they would all be lost. She asked Carrie to remember them and Carrie made good on a promise to her mother in the "Heritage of Songs". Carrie recorded with some historic names in the preserving of folk music (Allan Lomax and Elouise Linscott). Her recorded music has been archived in the USA Library of Congress. NATURE'S PANTRY AND PHARMACY

Spruce Beer

Homemade spruce beer has been something that I've wanted to make for some time but it just hasn't happened. I found a spruce beer recipe online and it isn't complicated. I also found one in "Out Of Old Nova Scotia Kitchens". I will give both recipes. The equipment for both is the same.



Harvesting Spruce Tips: Spruce tips are the bright green new growth on the end of spruce tree branches appearing in the spring. Using spruce tips in this recipe is preferred, but they are generally only available for a short time during the spring. Warmer regions will get spruce tips in late winter or early spring, and cooler regions in late spring. Try not to pick more than a small handful of spruce tips on each mature tree, and avoid taking tips from smaller trees. You can store these tips in the freezer if you are pressed for time. If it is the wrong time of the year for spruce tips, you can use spruce cuttings from older growth. The flavour will be a little stronger but still good. Tips from the Black, Red, White, Blue and Norway spruce can be used. You can also use the tips or older growth of any edible conifer such as pine, fir, or hemlock (the tree, not the poisonous plant). Be sure to avoid the yew tree as it is toxic.

Spruce Beer Recipe from the internet: This is an old-fashioned foraged brew. Feel free to add in some hops and malt if you are looking for more a **beer-like** flavour. This recipe called for champagne yeast but you can also use regular yeast instead. Before you start brewing, you will need some equipment. Equipment: Sanitizer, Large Pot, Long Handled Spoon, Thermometer, Fine Mesh Sieve, Large Funnel, One Gallon Glass Jug, Airlock with Rubber Stopper, Auto Siphon with Tubing, Bottling Wand and Flip Top Bottles.

Ingredients:

Gallon Water
cups dark brown sugar

4-6 ounces of spruce tips or cuttings 1 lemon

1/2 package champagne yeast

Directions: Before you begin, sanitize all of your brewing equipment. Mix the water, brown sugar, and spruce tips in a large pot. Cut and squeeze the lemon into the pot. Bring to a boil and let it boil for 30 minutes.

Place the pot into a pan of ice water until the wort has cooled to room temperature, about 70°F (21°C).

Strain the wort into a one gallon jug, leaving 2-3 inches of head space at the top, then add the yeast.

Cap the jug with a lid and give it a few shakes to combine and aerate. Put a bit of water in the airlock to the line, then position it on the jug.

Let the spruce beer ferment for at least 2-3 weeks, until the bubbles in the jug have slowed significantly but not completely.

Let the bottles sit for 3-4 weeks before drinking. Serve cold! **Notes:** Store beer in a cold, dark place to extend the shelf life to 1+ years. **Nutrition:** Serving: 10 ounces | Calories 140 kcal | Carbohydrates 36g | Sodium 21mg | Potassium 61mg | Sugar 35g | Calcium 30mg | Iron 0.2mg

"Out of Old Nova Scotia Kitchens" Recipe

1 1/2 cups white sugar 1 quart of boiling water

- 3 quarts cold water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

4-6 packages of dry yeast. 2-3 tablespoons of spruce extract

Directions: Dissolve the sugar in the boiling water. Add the cold water and the vanilla. Sprinkle yeast over and combine until well blended. Lastly add the spruce extract. Cover and set in a warm place to ferment about 12-16 hours. Remove the scum and bottle. Keep in a cool place.

You can use 4-6 ounces spruce tips or cuttings or green spruce buds if you like instead of the spruce extract. Ed Schofield

Jan. 5 - a very large flock of gold finches to feeder today.

Jan. 8 - a very snowy day, the woodpecker has been here all day sleeping and eating - feeders have been busy.

Jan. 10 - have had a flock of mourning doves-they are always at feeder but this flock had 31.

Jan. 11 - a very mild day so birds are taking advantage of it. Maybe they think it is spring.

Jan.14 - one lone starling to my feeder. Lately more and more birds at the feeder.

Jan. 15 - one lone grosbeak to my feeder. What's with these single guys?

Jan. 17- cold, windy day, so a very busy day at the feeders. So glad for all the amusement. Woodpeckers are not here. First time they have missed a meal all day long.

Jan. 18 - storm forecasted. The feeders are so very busy. The male gold finches already have a slight pigment change to their colour - it's a start.

Jan. 19 - lots of activity at the feeders, such fun. A pileated woodpecker makes his rounds every winter to the telephone pole across from my driveway. On the top part of the pole they are starting on their 18th hole. We have bobcat tracks at our garden spot and by the chicken coop.
