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
#### The Levy's in Black River By Charlton Levy

Families, like the tree roots and branches often used as a metaphor, expand rapidly. Especially, as many families in the recent past who tended to have large families, those families went on to establish families of their own and so on and so on. One of Black River's founding families, The Levy's, is a case in point. Perhaps in future editions of this newsletter, Levy family members will share some stories of their family branches. The following appears in The Descendants of Eliphalet and Annie (Jodrey) Levy, 1825-2005 researched and compiled by me and available at the Black River Hall for genealogical research. Eliphalet, in addition to being my grandfather, was the eighth generation from the "first" Levy of whom any information is known. His name was Isaac Levy, born in the 1600's in Germany. As you can understand, my account is fairly recent history.

"I realized many years ago that the descendants of Eliphalet and Annie were fast becoming like the tribes of Israel; numerous, and slowly becoming lost and unknown to each other through distance and time. It was, or has become, my intention to enclose all of the descendants between these covers. I realize that future years produce more descendants and that what lies herein is only temporal. It will remain for someone to fill in the spaces of those yet to come." My grandfather, Eliphalet, was born in the small hamlet of Sherwood, Lunenburg Co., NS, January 6<sup>th</sup>, 1865 and died October 13<sup>th</sup>, 1945 aged 80 years, nine months and three days. Annie Jodrey, his wife, was born in the community of Blockhouse, not far from Chester, August 1<sup>st</sup>, 1867 and died August 6<sup>th</sup>, 1936, having just turned 69 years of age.

Eliphalet and Annie continued to live in Sherwood until they moved in 1909. Somehow, perhaps on the advice of his brother Art (Artemus) who was already living in the Greenfield area, Eliphalet learned about a property for sale in the Greenfield area. Eliphalet purchased the property on what is now called the Jehiel Davidson Road (the current home and farm now operated by grandson, Freeman and Violet Levy and great-grandson, Andrew and Joanne).

# BLACK RIVER SKATING RINK... DENIED!

Sad news! I first contacted Ducks Unlimited, several month back, about possible funding for a pond construction in the corner across from the Hall. . Their response was...if it had been a site human activity had taken out of wetlands then they would consider a 'restoration' project. However, given that the area has basically returned naturally to swamp grass and alders Ducks Unlimited would not consider restoration interference with the site.

I informed Ducks Unlimited that it had been Dept. of Transportation that was ultimately responsible for the removal of a sluice gate and earthen 'ditch bank' that had retained water for the benefit of ducks and humans. Response was that Highways could ditch for the benefit of 'public highway' maintenance.

From there, I placed a call to Dept. of Environment. Over several days I conversed with NS Dept. of Environment's, Paula Francis, about the building of a small pond suitable for outdoor skating; controlling water level to increase wet area and permitting winter recreational use.

To excavate a small pond (ice surface), by their definition removing it from present "swamp" status, requires an application approval which would necessitate an 'offset construction of a much greater compensatory wet area' there or somewhere else. I asserted that a 'pond' would be a benefit to aquatic flora and fauna, that excavation need only be 30 cm deep or perhaps not at all if the ditch shoulder were raised.

Further, Paula added that since the area is 'naturalized' ...naturally returned to a wetland by definition; that approval would be denied even though there was potential for widespread community benefit.

Again, I asked if we could restore what the Department of Transportation interference had removed (ditch shoulder perm and sluice). I was likewise informed Transport could protect the road. Paula did ask if a pond could be dug elsewhere on the Black River Community Hall Property.

Long and short answer.... It is not getting approved!

\*In hopes of sharing the many talents and interests in our community we are making some changes to our usual format. Beginning on February 6, our sessions will be from 11:00 am until 3:00 pm. This will make one potholder, so bring more squares, etc. if you would like to make more. There will be kits available with enough materials to make two potholders. The cost of each kit is \$4.00.
