BIRD COUNT 2021

ith bright sun and no snow cover,
December 18 turned out to be perfect to
take part in this year's Wolfville Christmas Bird
Count. Again this year Anne and Bernie Brown helped
Pauline Meldrum and me cover the large Black River
area of the count. Because of the lack of snow many
birds had retreated back into the fields and woods
resulting in low numbers at feeders and road sides.

Finding birds with low numbers depends on being in the right place at the right time, plus the availability of food - therefore the results vary from year to year. The big increase in number of individual birds was due to a large flock of probably more than 350 Starlings feeding in a field. Open water and lots of food allowed more ducks to still be present. Blue Jay numbers were down while Red-breasted Nuthatches found in the woods had increased.

Our 23 bird species added up to 745 individual birds being located. The four of us thoroughly enjoyed a pleasant winter day spent roaming around Black River and Sunken Lake.

Sunken Lake and Area Journal of Wildlife Observations recorded by Clara Spinney

Nov 19 - Philip and Clayton Pick driving home from work came across a Snow Owl sitting by the side of the road at the top end of Sunken Lake at 4:30 in the afternoon.

Nov 21 - Put my bird feeders up a couple of days before I usually do. The chickadees made me feel quilty.

Nov 24- Blake Spinney saw four coyotes in the road at Miner Meadow Brook at about four o'clock in the afternoon.

The chickadees and nuthatches are happy birds now with the feeders up. There has not been any woodpeckers to the feeders yet. Nothing like the amount two years ago when there was so many. Hope they start coming again.

Dec 2 - The geese seem to have gone south. Haven't seen the flocks in the fields there was this past while.

Several sightings of the grey doe deer I reported earlier this past fall. So happy she made it through the hunting season.

Dec 7 - I saw a large flock of snow buntings on the Lower Sunken Lake Rd. My grandfather always said if you saw snow buntings it was a forerunner of a snow storm. You be the judge.

Dec 10 - Have a flock of doves that come feed under the feeders. Put cracked corn on the ground for them.

So far am only getting chickadees and nuthatches at the feeders. Should soon be getting junkos and goldfinches,

Of course I have blue jays. They are a beautiful bird but you tend to overlook their beauty while you are shaking your fists at them for being such gluttons.
