Wolfville Christmas Bird Count - December 16,2023

As usual the Sunken Lake and Black River areas of the count was covered by Bernard Forsythe, Pauline Meldrum, Bernie and Anne Brown.

With no snow cover and temperature around 0°C it was a pleasant day to be outside. We soon found out, our travels in cars over roads, along with walking along fields and through woods produced few or no birds. Most of the birds we recorded were at bird feeders and yards around houses and farms. The number of species located dropped down to 18 with the number of individual birds down to 332; both numbers lower than usual. Hopefully bird numbers will increase during future counts.

I have always been interested in recipes that have been invented out of necessity. Some of those recipes have survived and been passed down - others perhaps not so much but did serve their purpose.

We have all experienced a global pandemic and have and still are experiencing the effect of that (as well as the wars in other countries) that are causing soaring prices and shortages on everything including food. It has me pondering what recipes now will survive and be carried on in 50 years time. I wonder if it will be legumes and other beans as we are seeing an increased use of

them as a cheaper source of protein.

I would like to take us on a bit of a journey back and explore a few of those recipes and perhaps you, the reader, will have some of your own long



standing recipes and thoughts.

The following is one I have made and still do occasionally. It seems it may have replaced the spice cake recipe used before World War 2. It may have first started to appear as early as the 1920's, possibly more popular in the 1960's. In the 1920's Campbells would often advertise recipes to promote a new soup.

Tomato Soup Cake

Bake 1 hour at 350° F in a greased and floured tube pan.

- 2 cup flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp cloves
- 1 tsp nutmeg
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 can tomato soup
- 1 cup raisins

Mix together in order of recipe.

1 let it cool about 10 minutes before removing.

Hello Neighbour ...


On March 8 2011 our Community Hall was destroyed by fire. The following story is but one of the many stories of the people who helped rebuild it.


Sunken Lake and Area Journal of Wildlife Observations recorded by Clara Spinney

• Nov 22 Today the water birds put on quite a show - at least 250 Canada Geese landed out front on the lake, joined on the outer edges of the geese was a flock of Common mergansers, both male and female, one lone loon landed also, followed by five very plump black ducks.

I'm so close to the water they seemed very near to my front door. It was a real treat seeing all of this.

- •. **Dec 4** It snowed today so out went the feeders. I've had gold finches, chickadees and juncos visit the feeder but only a few of each. I usually have several woodpeckers at the suet feeder but so far not a one.
- **Dec 6-7** The lake froze over, which isn't out of the ordinary but it froze over so clear, not a ripple of any kind. For as many years as I've been on this lake I have never seen ice like this. The ice was tested at three inches. It was as clear as a window pane.
- **Dec 11** The ice went out again and we were visited again by some of the geese. They have not been here for a couple of days. Maybe they have called it quits for the winter.
