Hello, Neighbour!

SKYLIT, formerly Nova Solar Capital, was founded in 2016 by Canning residents Andrew Bagley and Christine Heap. At the time,

solar was in its infancy in Nova Scotia and there were no government incentives for



homeowners to go solar and a gap existed in financing for these kinds of projects. Andrew and Christine's vision was to create a company that could identify opportunitites in Solar PV and bring together the resources, including materials, expertise, project management, and financing, to realize these opportunities, while creating good jobs in the Annapolis Valley in an emerging industry.

The first project SKYLIT undertook with the launch of a Community Economic Development Investment Fund (CEDIF) is called Solar Scotia Energy. Solar Scotia Energy uses funds invested by Nova Scotians to finance solar on primarily residential properties throughout the province. To date, Solar Scotia Energy has raised over \$3.8 million and financed solar for more than 100 homes in Nova Scotia.

SKYLIT, which is the installation and project management company, continues to install systems financed by Solar Scotia Energy as well as for customers looking to purchase a solar installation without financing, and has also gone on to do other projects including putting nearly 300 solar panels on the Old Orchard Inn in June of 2020.

In March of 2021, SKYLIT purchased the former Long's Mill on Deep Hollow Road and immediately got to work refitting the building for use as warehouse space. SKYLIT's office is currently in downtown Kentville, but the plan is to build office space inside the building in White Rock and move the entire operation there in the next 12 to 18 months. This is a very exciting endeavour, SKYLIT is thrilled to bring the former Long's Mill property back into use, and are planning to retrofit the building in a way to reduce the carbon footprint and, of course, offset the energy usage with solar.

SKYLIT currently employees 9 people full-time, including 2 red-seal electricians, and 6 full-time seasonal employees on the installation crew. To date, they have completed more than 150 solar installations and are expanding their services to include the installation of electric vehicle chargers. In 2017 they were named Outstanding New Business of the Year, and in 2019 Outstanding Small Business of the Year by the Annapolis Valley Chamber of Commerce. They are members of CanREA (the Canadian Renewable Energy Association) and part of the Efficiency NS Preferred Partner Network.

What Is It?

It is an antique fire starter. Kerosene or lamp oil only, is poured over the ceramic ball and is absorbed. When the wand has absorbed the kerosene and small to larger pieces of wood have been placed in the stove the ceramic ball is lit. It is placed near the wood in the stove to start the fire. No paper necessary. After about ten minutes when the fire is going nicely the ceramic ball is extracted from the fire and stored in the cast iron pot with the cover on to smother any flames.

Lots of reports of woodchucks. Seems an over abundance of them this year. Watch your gardens!

Jun. 14 - Still waiting for the loons to produce babies. Don't know where she is nesting, been told several places but that can not be so.

The hummingbird population has dropped to almost none. Hope it is because there are so many blossoms now.

Jun. 16 - Forgot to say we have a nest of hairy woodpeckers in a hole of an old tree close by. Well hidden. Wouldn't have known about it if the babies weren't so noisy.
