As a child he pumped the organ in the church, but his voice was his instrument. I think in sharing his enjoyment of music his children received a wonderful gift.

did not receive even one sailor gene from mother's side of the family who were seafarers back many generations. Greatgrand-father built ships. Grandfather was a ship's captain. One uncle was and two of my cousins were lobstermen. One uncle was a merchant mariner. When I was eight, my uncle took me with him when he went to check his lobster traps. That simultaneously put firmly on the side of the lobsters and convinced me that I clearly took after my Scottish Highland side who were dyed in the wool land lubbers (and horse thieves, but that's another story for another day).

But we had a home on Sunken Lake. We had a canoe and our social circle of the day fancied ourselves pretty much back to the landers. One warm summer evening in August, 1975 or so, my husband and a friend took our 1974 brand new

Jeep Commando (colour Butterscotch - is it any wonder that model was discontinued rather rapidly and the colour never put on another vehicle ever?) and off they went. Very late that night, back they came towing a trailer on which were several canoes and one Kinsac Canoes sailboat. and Sailboats was a start-up and somehow company somebody got in touch with somebody else and there was to be be a "sea trial" and promotional tour for this company's products. For whatever reason, we were hosting it. It all felt terribly special as I recall.

Waldo Long owned most of the land around the lake. He made sure that no motorized boat of greater than 5 horse power plied the waves of Sunken Lake. That being the case, the lake would provide a nice, a safe venue to try out the handling and floatability of the canoes and the lone sailboat. Painted in several bright colours, the canoes were unloaded and carted down to the water's edge where they made a festive display.

I remember Greg



Scott Perry (names have been redacted but they know who they are) and Zane Long (a.k.a. hubby - there's no escape for him) were going to act as quality control and there may have been a couple of others. Memory fails. In any case, all afternoon the canoes were taken out on the lake, paddled around, testing for manoeuverability, ease of paddling, and whether or not the darn things would float. Eventually it was the sailboat's turn.

It wasn't at all sure that any of those there congregated had even the slightest idea about sailboats and/or sailing, but what they may have lacked in experience they made up for in enthusiasm. They did manage to get the sail hoisted and, two by two, off they went. Made a lovely sight. Blue water, blue sky, white sail. Quite bucolic - the quintessential Nova Scotia summer day. All captured on Hubby's 8mm movie camera for posterity's sake.

I have long forgotten why I ever decided to get in that boat, but in I did get. I was to work the sail while Scott was to work the rudder or whatever that thing is that steers the boat. That all by itself should tell you all you need to know about my level of seamanship. We hadn't got too far when it was clear that we'd best change places.

The wind caught the sail which billowed out above our heads beautifully. Occasionally Scott would yell, "Tack!" which I had been told meant for me to move the rudder handle one way and then the other.
