# **Duck and Moose Calling**

few months back, with the excitement of moose hunting season opening, I was reminded of a time in the early nineties when I was taught how to call moose by the World Champion.

I was asked by the Winchester Hunting School to give seminars on stalking whitetail deer at the Toronto Sportsman's Show. I was to do three seminars a day for the duration of the show. Since I had written magazine articles about this subject they wondered if I could present a seminar on the topic. So the challenge was on.

The seminars were going well, the attendance was more than I expected and comments were favourable. I had a booth at the show and Saturday morning the show manager asked me if I could help him out! It seemed the World Champion Duck Calling Contest was starting within an hour and the judge for the Eastern flyway was under the weather (something about the

water in Toronto). I explained that I didn't hunt waterfowl but that did not deter him and I was signed up.

The judges were introduced to the contestants and I have to say I have never seen so much cammo and duck bands before or since! We were led off to a small room with a table and chair for each of us and a traffic light, red, yellow and green! A person stood in front of the table and placed a paper sheet and pen on the table. No one could speak. The light changed from red to yellow and green. Each contestant did a series of different calls and



stopped when the light turned red. We then marked our score on the paper, and it was taken to be tabulated. These gentlemen sounded more like ducks than ducks! The winners were announced and I was relieved that I held my own in scoring.

I was back at my booth and there he was again. A moose calling competition was next. Again one of the judges was ill and would I be a judge for the moose call. I had some experience with duck calls but not moose! NO!

After some discussion, they then asked me If I would go onstage and have the world Champion Moose caller Owen Scott teach me how to call a moose. He gave me a call and proceeded to teach me the different calls that would decide the champion.

I still have the call and someday, perhaps, even with my feeble attempts at moose calling, a moose will arrive.



The picture above shows the antlers from the last moose my father-in-law Percy Atwell, his brother Maxi and his father Lawson shot in Black River. They sold some of the meat in Wolfville for 15¢ a pound! That's what I was told.

# Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee Medal Recipient Black River

ARK LONG is the son of Gladys and Zane Long and grew up in Black River. He is the recipient of the Oueen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal in 2022.

The medal was created to mark the 70th anniversary of Queen Elizabeth's accession to the throne. It is a two-fold honour - a way to

honour the Queen's service and to honour significant contributions and achievements made by residents of the province. To be considered for the medal, a person had to be a resident of Nova Scotia, and to have made a significant contribution to Canada, Nova Scotia or a particular region or community.

Formerly a constable with the RCMP and a retired Halifax Regional Police Officer Mark was diagnosed with PTSD in 2016 as a result of his time working in both fields. It is well known that help for those who suffer with PTSD and other mental health issues is scarce. When he sought help he found discrimination, callous disregard for his suffering and various other challenges. He needed help.

"After returning from a PTSD Program in Malibu, California in 2018, called Save A Warrior, run by former military veterans and first responders, Mark was inspired by the message that was taught. Service to your community is how we heal and gain purpose in life again. Two months later,

Mark launched CRACKED ARMOUR GEAR, a n online platform and clothing brand that provides information on ТВІ PTSD. (Traumatic Brain Injuries), and mental health as well as raises awareness for the suicide



epidemic in the military veteran community, the first responder community, and the helping professions."

"Using his online platform, Mark raises awareness to the plight of warriors who commit suicide because there is little help, understanding or support. Something he has experienced first hand."

" Mark has purchased a 76 acre property in Bishopville which he is transforming into a PTSD program. It is a retreat, a safe place for warriors to heal and share their stories. This is the first program of its kind in Canada."

# Sunken Lake and Area Journal of Wildlife Observations recorded by Clara Spinney

• Jan 20 - Tara Lee McLearn reported a male cardinal at their bird feeders. First spotted by

Deanna Schofield next door. This is the first report of a cardinal this season.

• Jan 24 - The nicest of surprises today! Looking out at the lake, which is lightly frozen over, an otter popped up at the water's edge, where the brook



comes from the swamp across the road. That is the first time we have seen an otter here. It played around on the ice a bit. Wish it would have stayed longer.

• I have still not had my old count of woodpeckers to the suet feeders; just a downy so far. I do not know what has happened to them. I have noticed a large decline in all species of birds.

• **Feb 4** - As everyone knows we got hit with a very cold, windy blast of Old Man Winter. This weather was very hard on birds; I felt so bad for them. The old Christmas tree we have on our deck came in handy. It filled with the small birds, even two female evening grosbeaks, which I haven't had so far. The tree is out of the wind so that was a bonus.

•. It has been a strange winter. I haven't had a problem with squirrels yet. Of course now that I have



mentioned it, they will show up.

• Two pileated woodpeckers at my son Byron's yard this morning. They are so nice to see and only attacking trees that are dying and full of bugs.

•. Another wonderful surprise! This morning two otters popped up in the same open water as before. One with an eel in its mouth, the other in hot pursuit. A beautiful way to start the day.
