


Hello, Neighbour! Porcupine Creek PRODUCTS

This month we are looking at a crafter who has combined her talents with the CNIB VisionMate Program. The result has been a 6 year partnership and the creation of **Porcupine Creek Products.** I'll now let Nellie Schofield provide some details about her vision issues, the CNIB VisionMate Program and some of the products that are produced.

I was diagnosed with low pressure glaucoma about 25 years ago. This will eventually cause permanent vision loss. I was directed to the CNIB because of my condition and this resulted in the first partnership in the VisionMate Program in Nova Scotia.

The VisionMate Program pairs up a visually challenged individual with a CNIB approved volunteer partner that allows for activities that may not be possible otherwise. This program allows a partner to share a minimum of 2 hours a week with a visually challenged individual; my VisionMate partner volunteer is Angela Clair.

Our partnership resulted in the creation of **Porcupine Creek Products.** Angela spends Wednesday evenings cutting fabric so I can sew bags during the week. Our products include wine bags, car seat ponchos, reversible large grocery bags and our signature stiff sided tote bags.

Most of **Porcupine Creek Products** are sold at local markets. That has been a challenge in the last couple of years but we have been lucky to have a presence on Facebook and that allows me to create, post and sell from this platform.

I can now make a bag in a day if all goes well and I have a "good sight day". On average, it takes about 2 days to complete a bag. All bags are washer and dryer safe and will maintain their shape despite repeated washing and drying. Many have water resistant bottoms.

Porcupine Creek has bags in Dubai, Alaska, Nunavut, England, Scotland, Bahamas and many other States in the USA, as well as most of the provinces in Canada. Our largest order was from a local company that ordered forty bags as gifts for their clients!

Community support has been marvelous. Many people in the area have "Nellie Bags" and some have more than one. Several bags have been donated to local fundraisers.

Currently, I have a great variety of bags in stock at home. Visit us on Facebook or just drop in.

The CNIB is always looking for volunteers for the VisionMate Program in all areas of the province but especially the Valley area. As Nellie says "This program enlarges the world of the visually impaired person."

February 2, 1949

Sunken Lake and Area Journal of Wildlife Observations recorded by Clara Spinney

Jan 23 - A nice pair of red winged blackbirds at my feeder. Really odd for this time of year.

Jan 28 - Talking with Donna Levy who was telling me that she and Hank have lots of juncos at their feeder. Also they have one lone cardinal which is the only sighting I have heard of this year.

Feb 1 - Well as anyone who reads these Nature Notes will recall me saying I haven't seen any squirrels - that has changed. I now have one here constantly, with two cats that couldn't care less. They look at one another through the windows until they get bored.

Philip and Tracey Pick are fortunate to have partridges enjoying their shrubs around their house.

The crows are starting to build a nest in the trees up the road from here. Seems too cold for hatching little ones

Feb 12 - Have had lots of reports of robins - one of my neighbours even baked an apple pie so she could put the peelings out for them.

Feb 17 - Took my feeder down due to the avian virus which has been found in various places in Nova Scotia. It is recommended that due to the infectious nature of the virus that we not feed the birds now.

Feb.20 - a long-tailed red squirrel was seen at Gladys and Zane Long's which is much bigger than our common red-tailed squirrel.
