emories of our mothers are always precious, likewise are those of my late mother Helen Marion (Atwell) Levy.

My childhood memories of Mum are some of the fondest and now the funniest although not so much at the time.

One such childhood memory took place while helping with the daily farm chores. I remember my mother routinely helping with the farm work and chores in addition to all the farm housework. On one such occasion Mum was pitching silage out of the silo and



down the silage chute. My oldest brother Barry and I were tasked with filling the silage cart and feeding the silage to the milking cows. Now Barry and I were still very young and hardly big enough to manoeuvre the silage forks and certainly not strong enough to be able to handle the silage cart. In fact, when we would get the silage cart full, we would have to go get Dad, who was doing the milking at the time, to wheel the cart up the ramp onto the level alley way so we could pitch the feed into the manger.

On this particular occasion Mum was pitching the silage down the chute faster than Barry and I could keep it cleared away and as a result the chute hole got plugged and Mum was up in the silo with no way out. The harder Barry and I tried to dig out the silage chute the more packed it became. Finally, in a panic I went to get Dad for help. Of course, he was busy milking so his response was, "Well I guess she will just have to stay up there."

Both Barry and I burst into tears thinking we had seen the last of our mother. Using both silage forks and our hands we frantically dug away at the packed silage chute in hopes of saving our Mum. All of a sudden, with dress far above her knees, out slid mother through the tiny hole and landed at the bottom of the silage pile. She brushed the silage from her clothes, straightened out her dress and as I remember wondered what all the fuss was about.

Of course, in hindsight I'm sure Dad would never have actually left Mum up in the silo for very long, certainly not beyond supper time.

## Last Class

S most of you know, the site of our wonderful Hall was first occupied by the Black River School. The original building was opened about 1870. A second room was added in 1945 and the old school number was "67". Ironically, it closed in 1967. This might have been the end to all school classes held in the building but for this bit of history, which been

brought to light in an interview with the teacher involved, Nellie Schofield.

In the Winter and Spring of 1999 a new class was taught at the Black River Schoolhouse. I was approached by a number of people to see if a GED course could be held at the school. The GED course is a General Equivalency Development program which enables adults, who did not graduate from High School, to complete their public education. Fifteen students originally enrolled and twelve completed the program.



The majority of the classes were spent on Math and English Grammar, as well as practice in writing essays. Social Studies and Science were basically comprehension reviews. The Math classes covered everything from simple arithmetic to high school Geometry and Algebra. Assignments were given and quizzes and tests provided the needed reviews.

The Grammar classes covered Spelling, Punctuation and Sentence Structure. These topics led into the writing of a 250 word essay on the topic that was chosen by the Exam Board. It was always a broad based topic sentence that the student had to respond to with complete sentence, proper punctuation as well as an introduction, body and conclusion. This was the only paper marked by a person as all other exams were corrected by a computer. If you did not get a passing grade on the essay, you did not get the English credit.

Classes were held 2 nights a week for about 12 weeks. The exams were written over a weekend in May. Friday night was English Grammar and English Literature. Saturday exams were Social Studies, Science and Math.

The students were quite well prepared for the exams and they were written at KingsTec in what used to be the old welding classroom.

This small group became very supportive of each other during the course and often helped each other when stuck. We worked on the old brown, wooden tables and I used a White Board to write on. A great deal of learning

and laughter took place there and it was a pleasure to teach these students.

- We have a lone purple finch. It has been here for quite awhile. It is the only one we've had all winter.
- Phil and Tracey Pick have multiple pairs of yellow-bellied sapsuckers at their place. They are hoping they will move on as they kill maple and birch trees by boring holes in the bark, then suck

the sap out which in turn kills the trees.

• There are three pairs of ducks staying here in the brookway, a



mixture of black and mallard, soon will be nesting.

- •. Of course, we have the beaver and otters. I'm going to try to get along with the beavers. We safe guarded any trees we value by putting wire mesh around them. I am going to try.
- Zelma Long tells me the deer are back enjoying her lawn grass. That is so nice.

Even with the abundance of birds here I'll soon be taking the feeders down. Then up goes the hummingbird feeders. That is only 2-3 weeks away. Yea!
