
# THE COMMON CATTAIL (Typha latifolia)

This month we will look at a common plant seen in all areas of our

province and most of the country. It is the Cattail. This plant has been used for centuries as a great source of vitamins, minerals and carbohydrates. It has been called the "Walmart of the Swamp".

**Identification:** Cattails are recognized by the long stalk and brown catkins. They have sword like leaves and grow in marshes, swamps and other wet areas. Many children have enjoyed collecting these catkins and breaking them up to see the fluff blow in the wind.


**Useful parts of the plant:** Nearly all parts of the plant can be used from the green shoots in the spring to the catkins in the fall. For this



**Preparation:** Since cattails can gather and store metals and other pollutants, be careful where you harvest.

The rhizomes, a root-like, underground stem are gathered in the late fall

for the best harvest although they can be harvested anytime, even in winter. It is easier to collect the roots from the outside edge of a colony. Find a good plant and follow the stalk down into the mud until you locate a horizontal root. This may lead to another plant. Cut the root between the plants. The outside layer of this root can be removed by rubbing when harvested or by roasting and then removing the layer. What you have left is a whitish root that can be chewed as is or used in soups or stews. These can also be sliced into coins and dried for later use. When dried, these can be ground into a flour to be used in pancakes or breads or anywhere flour is used. A great



benefit is that it is gluten free. This requires a great amount of roots, so make sure you have a good supply but don't overharvest.

**Benefits:** Apart from their distinctive taste, cattail is a good source of nutrients, vitamins and minerals. Consuming 19 gram of cattail offers 0.144 mg of Manganese, 4.3 mg of Vitamin K, 12 mg of Magnesium, 0.9 g of Total dietary Fiber, 0.17 mg of Iron, 0.023 mg of Vitamin B6 and 21 mg of Sodium.

Some benefits may include:

- Provides natural antiseptic properties
- · Helps in preventing Anaemia
- Provides skin care
- Helps in cancer prevention
- · Provides steady increase in energy
- Provides cardio tonic and lipid-lowering effects
- · Helps in reducing the risks of atherosclerosis
- · Helps in controlling diabetes
